SPOSA CHILD IN THE TIME OF COVID.

Reports (summary) from foundations we worked with, Holy Family Home, Cameleon Association and Ms. C.Felizario.



"In the first 2 years of Covid, as we still clearly remember the hardships we dealt with using the



Modular system for the public schools basically and the online classes for the college students. At the beginning, we found it impossible and difficult. But after 2 years had passed, we saw the good results of having it in Holy Family

Home. There were several consequences that resulted; we had close monitoring of our girls especially the newly admitted girls from the mountains, who could hardly read and write. We were able to follow them up closely and the improvement was fast and quite satisfying. Secondly, we were very secure of their safety since they were in the center all the time.

Thirdly, we were able to insert a variety of activities for them because we owned our time.

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There were so many girls in the center that had to be kept physically active to counteract the quarantine.



Lastly, since there is close monitoring, many of them have excelled in their grades.

However, we still prefer the old ways of learning; the routine of going to the school and so forth. We are still in the stage of adjustments. Many of our girls had expressed their preference for the present system because they can focus better. Although we know that the "face to face" system



of education is still the best way of learning. Our girls also need exposure and must learn to interact with others. Sometimes, we can see that some of them get accustomed

to the life in our "Home" so that they don't exert efforts for improvement and they become indifferent to what is happening outside. They easily complain at simple difficulties. Sometimes, they forget to appreciate those people who are helping them.

We are always there to guide them. You're presence in their lives as our partners are truly being appreciated. We altogether dream that these girls will become better persons and will not forget where they came from. At the same time we remind them that they have the right to have a brighter future".

Being our partners for many years, we are truly grateful that until now you have opened your hearts to us, and gave hope to these 7 girls who are SPOSA CHILD scholars. Thank you so much. And may God bless you a hundredfold.



"The 3 Sposa child beneficiaries under the care of Cameleon Association, Bacolod City, kept a strict program for uninterrupted online learning for the girls. Several of them achieved outstanding academic performances like a gold medal for excellent performance and leadership. 2 of our 3 girls were on the dean's list, honor students, 2 of these are taking Bachelor of Science in Social Work.

To avoid the consequences of quarantine, the girls were taught to bring out their creativity in different media e.g. painting, cooking and

baking, nail care & foot spa, fish processing & value adding, lantern making, sack gardening.

Difficulties had come her way most especially on financial aspect as she is living with her single parent mom who is a market vendor and a grandmother. She has a heart of gold that she is willing to work with her mother during weekends or whenever free from school schedules.

This schoolyear, Sarah will face new challenges as an intern and as a graduating student. This will be essential for her growth as a future Social Worker and will also serve as her training ground towards work-related environment that she may use in the near future".

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In 2020, FACTORS Closing of schools and shift of education to online classes expose children to the dangers of the internet, especially when left with limited adult supervision. Confinement at home leaves children to look for other sources of entertainment they can do indoors, to which the answers are often internet and social media.

Heightened stress levels, isolation and drastic change of lifestyle caused by the pandemic increases the likelihood of children to act on impulses - factors that most offenders are likely to exploit.
